He had rapidly established himself as an expert in inflammatory bowel disease after completing a period of study and research at Oxford. His work in setting up the first IBD Clinic at the Alfred Hospital, where he was a Visiting Consultant Gastroenterologist, will continue to benefit both patients and physicians alike into the future.

On behalf of the ACMAV, the Committee extends its deepest sympathy to the family of Lee Min. He will be sadly missed.

A dream comes true

The following is an article written by reporter Danny Lannen for the *Geelong Advertiser* and appeared in print on 18th November 2006.

HONG Hanh's voice is sweet and light and pours forth from a heart filled with hope. She says she dreams about running her own small bookshop or newsagency so she can support herself with the written word and care for her son Nhut, 5. The former business management student yearns for independence, the barest independence, and Geelong plastic surgeon lan Holten brought that simple, complex ambition closer yesterday.

Hong Hanh Thi Luong, 26, is from Saigon in Vietnam. She suffered horrific burns two years ago when in the darkness of depression she acted against an abusive husband by gathering his clothes and using petrol to set them alight. Rudimentary medical treatment meant she healed inside a cruelly distorted body. Her chin and the sides of her face fused with her shoulders. Her upper arms fused to her sides. Her hands became useless knots of scar tissue. She lost ability to care for herself in the most basic ways. Her son offered what help he could and she moved into the full-time care of nuns.

A Vietnamese-Australian woman met Hong Hanh's sister during a trip to Vietnam and returned to Australia brandishing her photograph and a will to see her life changed. The woman spent more than a year trying to find help in Adelaide and then through her brother passed her mission on to Dr Theong Low of the Australian Chinese Medical Association of Victoria. He turned to someone he knew would help, lan Holten, and at Geelong's St John of God Hospital yesterday dreams started coming true. Mr Holten headed a team, including Dr Robyn Edwards and anaesthetist Dr Eion Fehsenfeld, who volunteered time and expertise to start freeing Hong Honh from the prison of her body. They operated for five and a half hours to separate her face from her shoulders and release and reconstruct bound skin around her midriff and pelvis.

The work was perilous. The shape of Hong Hanh's neck meant they were unable to insert a tube down her throat and fully anaesthetise her. Mr Holten had to cut her throat while she was awake under local and ``twilight" anaesthetic.

Hong Hanh spoke from her hospital bed before going into surgery. Her dark eyes shone with spirit. She said through interpreter, the Venerable Phuoc Tan that she felt nerves, happiness and worry in her heart but that her wish to be independent caring for herself and her son was strong. The day she had arrived in Australia she had kicked herself to make sure she was not dreaming. Mr Holten said the St John of God Foundation would help Hong Hanh undergo many more operations during the next year as she continued a profound journey.

Since the Geelong Advertiser article, Hong has had 2 further operations:

- 1. Release of contractures of her neck and perineum. This has allowed her to close her eyes and mouth for the first time. As I reported when I saw her at St John Of God Hospital, she was able to wink, smile and whistle for the first time in years! She was also reported to be singing all day long!
- 2. Release of her right arm from her chest wall. During this operation, she encountered some problem with the anaesthesia, requiring a tracheostomy to be inserted. However, she was able to fully extend her elbow and now has almost full range of her shoulder movement. She did fall into a rather low spirit after this operation due to the "trachi" but her spirit

picked up immediately after it was removed. She was taken to the Geelong Yacht club by Ian Holten and was apparently independent with feeding herself during the day.

She is currently home with the host family and is now standing upright, showing off her new height, comparing it with her host! I witnessed her signing the consent form for her next operation at the end of January.

I guess these are all very small steps in her improvement, but nevertheless these are things that we all take for granted. I really get the greatest "kick" from seeing such achievements reached in patients such as Hong Hanh, and as I have always said: this is what it is all about!

Update on Project Africa

To kick off the new year, Drs Benny Foo and Min Li Chong along with their family and friends helped load a 40 ft container with hospital theatre lights, various hospital and theatre equipment, operating theatre lighting, operating tables, instrument trays, bowls trolleys, patient trolleys, sterilisers, hospital beds, wheelchairs, computers, printers, monitors, TVs, medical text books, medical charts, triangular bandages, dressings, infant formulas, clothing, soft toys, pre-lived bicycles and many other odds and ends.

This container is destined for Zambia where a new hospital building is awaiting completion. It is attached to an existing Day Clinic that also hungers for more medical equipment. They are in need of second hand x-ray machines, incuba-

tors, ECG machines, sphygnomanometers, stethoscopes, auroscopes, ophthalmoscopes, needles, syringes and anything to do with the running of a medical clinic and hospital.
