Thanks to ACMAV's webmaster Erwin Loh, we now have a new improved web-page.



Associate Professor Joe Tjandra (left) died on 18th lune after a 10-month battle with bowel cancer.

In the words of Mr Campbell Penfold, his former mentor at the Royal Melbourne Hospital, Joe was

"extraordinary and amazingly talented". His contribution to the field of colorectal and general surgery was immense, and is measured not only in terms of his research, teaching and publications (including the Textbook of Surgery familiar to most medical graduates), but also the countless patients who benefited from his dedication, surgical expertise and innovation.

Joe was a member of our Association, whose lectures

were memorable for both their high educational content, and their humour. He will be remembered with great fondness and admiration.

Jeans, who successfully returned to coaching after delicate aneurysm surgery. Kevin is a well known member of the ACMAV, and his organizational skills and vast experience have served our membership well. His ongoing commitment to our Association has been duly recognized in achieving this high honour.

Chinese National Day Honour for Mr Michael Yii

Mr Michael Yii, Head of the Cardiothoracic Department at St Vincent's Hospital and ACMAV member, was recently honoured at a ceremony in Henan province, China. The Yellow River Friendship Award is a National Day award presented to foreigners who have made an outstanding contribution to the economic development and social

progress of the people of central China. Mr Yii was one of only 8 recipients of the annual award, and the only one in the medical category. He was nominated by the Henan People's Provincial Hospital in recognition of his contribution to developing the most successful CABG unit in Henan. The province of Henan has a population of

about 100 million. Michael has been an Honorary Professor and Director of the Cardiac Surgery Department at the hospital since 2001. The award was presented by the Governer of the province last month.

The ACMAV congratulates Michael on this outstanding achievement.

I have difficulty writing as I have macular deterioration of the eyes.

Dear Dr Theong Low,

Thank you for the receipt received today. It gives me much pleasure if I can help make a better lift for some one worse off than I am. We are on this earth to help each other. You asked for a photo of me, so I have enclosed one which is fairly recent. I am a 91 year old pensioner—I have a bad heart condition and was in hospital for five weeks in June and July. Unfortunately I was in an aeroplane crash into the ocean in Queensland a few years back and had impacted fractures of the spine and have been crippled and I constant pain since. I apologise for not typing this, but I now have macular deterioration of the eye sight and only have half sight in one eye and some in the other; but I can still see the colour of the flowers and the sunset.

I have never married, but have worked overseas as well as Melbourne and Geelong. I've traveled in forty different countries and have a number of friends in the different countries around the world.

Thís is just a few notes about my life and hope it is what you asked for. I give all I can to the many organisations I can, and am glad to do so.

I apologise for such a poorly written letter, but it is hard to see. M electric type writer sits forlornly on the shelf because I can't see the keys properly.

Over the past few years, community based projects have become an important part of the ACMAV's activities. This has largely been through assistance programs for needy individuals to come to Australia for medical treatment, or to help (through the donation of second hand equipment and small cash contributions) the work of groups or individuals providing health care in Third World countries. As such, "community" is considered in a broad global context, or at least this has been the nature of our activities to date.

So why is the ACMAV involved in Vietnam and Africa when we are an "Australian Chinese" association?

Firstly, it must be noted that there is overwhelming support for the involvement of the ACMAV in community-based projects. Under the leadership of past President Benny Foo the ACMAV Foundation was established to encourage a culture of giving. As doctors we should be mindful of the fact that we are not just members of a *privileged* profession, but also a *caring* one, and one that shares an acute understanding of the personal needs of others.

Secondly, the experience and expertise of some members in health related projects has enabled the Association to have a "running start" in developing its own projects. The fact that so much has been achieved in such a short time period of time is in large part due to the advice and hard work of Theong Low and Benny Foo in particular, who have been able to carry forward some of their community work on behalf of the ACMAV. It is Dr Foo's contacts through the Rotary Club of Templestowe that have enabled the ACMAV to be involved in Project Africa.

Thirdly, and most importantly, the projects currently being undertaken and supported by our Association are providing a platform for further activities in the future. It is the publicity of these good deeds which is in turn generating financial support from others outside of the ACMAV. The ACMAV's proven track record in being able to successfully bring patients from developing countries for major surgery in Melbourne has led to the donation of significant amounts from the local Vietnamese Buddhist community and the Lion's Club of Melbourne Chinese. Many individuals, including ACMAV members, their family and friends, and even members of the public who have heard about our activities (see Ms Olive James' letter, left) have also contributed.

In this way, single projects become longer-term ones and a narrow focus becomes wider. Good deeds beget further good deeds, and as our activities attract further donations and the support of volunteers, so the ACMAV will be able to expand its community activities into other areas, both locally and afar. This may include more projects involving the local Chinese community. Furthermore, in relation to activities overseas, if the ACMAV ever intends to be directly involved in charitable work abroad, a lengthy process of government approval is needed, and a part of the process of acquiring this status is to demonstrate a record of close involvement with existing overseas relief funds.

Thus the current community projects of the ACMAV, while very worthwhile in themselves, are only small parts of a larger vision. As opportunities present themselves, we shall be in a sound position to build on these successes.



At the September Seminar, Dr Benny Foo (right) presented to the audience a project to support a hospital in Lugazi province, Uganda. Nyenga Hospital is based in a rural district, approximately 60km from the capital city Kampala. The hospital, which is managed by the Little Sisters of St Francis, is 75 years old and very basic in structure. The majority of patients are peasants and fishermen, and a sizeable portion of patients suffer from TB, leprosy and HIV/ AIDS. The staff consists of 3 doctors, 16 nurses, 3 medical assistants, 2 laboratory technicians and 10 nursing assistants.

Nyenga Hospital is experiencing frequent power failures, and since electricity supply is needed to extract water from surrounding bore holes, there is a dangerous lack of access to vital water supplies. Only 5% of Ugandan homes have access to electricity, and at the hospital electricity is only available for 5 hours twice a week. In addition, the mechanical pumps often fail, meaning that water sometimes needs to be transported from another bore hole 3 hours away.

The installation of a Solar Pump will make a significant difference in overcoming this water and power shortage. Donations received through ACMAV will go towards the purchase of the Solar Pump, and other essential equipment such as a Solar Lighting System for the Children's Ward.



HOW CAN I HELP?

Sr Mary Steven Namakula of the Nyenga Hospital has requested help in setting up a nursing school library to assist in running a course for 100 students (annual intake of 33) over a 2½ year training period.

The following are required:

- Textbooks relating to: Anatomy & Physiology, Nursing basics, Medical & Surgical Nursing, Microbiology, Pharmacology, First Aid, Midwifery, Gynaecology, Paediatrics, Community Health, Palliative Health
- Training models: Human Skeleton (assembled full set or encased half set), Teaching models of the circulatory, GI, respiratory, etc. systems, Charts & Diagrams

Ken Henry & the Rotary Club of Templestowe are also assisting the Makeni Hospital in Zambia. **Medical equipment**, **computers**, **portable diagnostic equipment**, and **trolleys & beds** are being sought.

Volunteer doctors & nurses are needed to spend a few months assisting & training local staff at these hospitals.

Hong has been an inpatient at the St John of God Hospital Geelong, for treatment of her severe burns, since August 2007. Her left arm is now released from her chest and she is scheduled for more surgery to release contractures in her left hand.

On 17th September, her son Nhut aged 6, arrived from Vietnam accompanied by Tuyet Tran who is a nun at the Convent where Hanh was nursed for the three years prior to her leaving for Australia. I drove him to the hospital to meet his Mum, but unfortunately the reunion was almost disastrous. The long separation from his mother, arriving in a strange country still tired, and the huge con-

tingent of well wishers was just too overwhelming for him! However he is now slowly adjusting and has bonded well with Mum. He is staying with a family in Sunshine West and we are attempting to enroll him into a local Catholic school for his 3 month stay in Melbourne.

As for Hanh, she has now regained a great deal of independence and has become a darling with the nurses at St John of God Hospital. She is looking forward to spending more time with her son when she is able to be discharged from hospital.
