ACMAV asked to help East Timor

East Timor is not only the newest sovereign nation, but also in terms of per capita GDP, industry and infrastructure, also one of the world's most disadvantaged. Australia continues to play an important role in the affairs of this country (beyond just the issue of security) and Melbourne is home to the largest population of East Timorese immigrants.

The ACMAV recently met with some representatives from East Timor who are seeking assistance from Australian individuals and organizations to help in the development of local and governmental health services. In August last year, the Committee met with the remarkable Dr Dan Murphy, for years the only Western doctor in East Timor, who single-handedly established a clinic for the poor and displaced, called the Bairo Pite Clinic, which continues to provide free health services to some of the most needy in the local community (see p. 9). In November, the Committee hosted Mr Nelson Martins, the East Timorese Health Minister, who was visiting Melbourne at the time. An invitation was extended by the Minister for an ACMAV delegation to visit East Timor to observe first hand the current state of health services.

It was made clear from these meetings that there is an acute need for medical expertise to firstly provide an adequate standard of health for the people or East Timor, and secondly to build the workforce and infrastructure needed to support the health sector into the future. The large majority of doctors working in Dili's main hospital are "visiting" specialists

who will one day return to their home countries, and while the training of local medical students has begun with the help of Cuban doctors, it will be many years before the medical workforce is self-sustaining.

Although only preliminary discussions have taken place, the ACMAV has the rare opportunity to play a part in helping to build a country's health system from the ground up. In doing so it could join organizations such as the College of Surgeons in offering assistance to the East Timorese Government. Alternatively direct assistance could be provided to support the valuable work of Dr Murphy at the Bairo Pite Clinic. Either way, much collaborative work and creative thinking will be required.






Congratulations Dr Benny Choong Khean Foo OAM!

In upholding our motto, we perform free concerts at many of the hospitals around the University of Melbourne, including the Royal Children's, Royal Melbourne, and Royal Women's Hospitals, the Royal Victorian Institute for the Blind, and we have been invited to perform this year at the Royal Dental Hospital. We also aim to expand our venues to Austin Health/Mercy Hospital for Women and Shepparton Base Hospital in 2008.

One Man's Medical Mission

Late last year, members of the ACMAV Committee had the privilege of meeting with Dr Dan Murphy, an extraordinary doctor whose work in East Timor over the past 9 years can be regarded in no other way but as a service to humanity of the highest order. We met him at a local Chinese restaurant during a rare visit to Melbourne to raise support for his Bairo Pite Clinic. He was accompanied by Dr Aida, one of the few fully-trained East Timorese doctors working at the Clinic. The tall American towered over his petite colleague, but this gentle and humble man is in fact made large by an enormous reserve of courage, determination and compassion. He had after all borne the weight of being for a while the only Western trained doctor in an impoverished country devastated by violence and social disintegration.

Dr Dan sought the support of the ACMAV for his ongoing work in Dili. The first step is for members of the ACMAV to be made aware of the Bairo Pite Clinic and the desperate need for assistance in helping to improve the immediate and long term health outcomes of the East Timorese people. Tuberculosis and malaria remain highly prevalent and often fatal, and there is an alarming increase in the incidence of HIV/AIDS. The following are excerpts from the Bairo Pite Clinic website http://bairopiteclinic.tripod.com which paint a picture of the history and current activities of the BPC.

"The year is 1999. I arrived in Dili and took off through the smoking ruins to find a clinic for those Timorese who had survived the devastating Indonesian exit. So began Bairo Pite Clinic. Scrounging ruins for any remnants of usable equipment or medication, we attended to the thousands or returning refugees, all gaunt, all with diarrhea, many seriously ill, and most with only the shirt on their back...Sixty thousand trickling down from the hills...then the patients with tuberculosis and malaria mixed in with the malnourished children filled with parasites. An enormous challenge yet people were gracious and patient."

"...I began my medical mission in earnest. Killing, torture and massacres were a steady diet ... my hands were always in the gaping wounds of suffering." - Dr Dan Murphy

Bairo Pite Clinic (BPC) is an NGO health clinic, located in Dili, that provides free health care services to those in need. Originally the clinic was set up to serve the immediate needs of a population affected by a humanitarian crisis. As the violence subsided, BPC has adapted and transformed from an emergency medical service to a more comprehensive community health service, offering a variety of services, including childhood immunizations, prenatal care, dental work and emergency care. Today BPC remains one of the most highly visited health clinics in the country. It is served by 32 Timorese staff and three permanent international volunteers. [Ed. Although Dr Dan was originally the only doctor, he is now assisted by a few Indonesian-trained East Timorese doctors, including Dr Aida].

On average, the clinic sees 300 or more patients per day, with a strict policy that every patient must be seen. The vision of the BPC is "Come work together in Timor-Leste to develop our community's health". This vision has been put into practice through capacity building of the local Timorese and the training of many international medical students who volunteer at the BPC. The work of the BPC would not be possible without the volunteers and the charitable donations from people and organizations around the world.

[There are no tertiary institutions in East Timor, so medical training has been through Indonesian universities] Those that returned to East Timor found a country destroyed by the anger of Indonesian troops and the militias. Some found a place to work at Bairo Pite Clinic alongside Dr Dan. Many still wanted to finish their degrees and with the assistance of BPC and generous others, some have been lucky enough to find places in overseas medical schools. It is hoped upon their return they will be then able to care for their country alongside other East Timorese doctors.

Points about volunteering for a medical elective at BPC:

- BPC is a primary healthcare clinic run by Dr Dan Murphy.
- Dan works 6 and half days a week, with a teaching round on Sunday mornings.
- Opportunities exist for experience in the following areas: obstetrics, paediatrics, infectious diseases (eg. Malaria, TB, dengue, typhus), dentistry, minor trauma, public health, trauma rehabilitation.
- Indonesian, Tetun and Portuguese are more useful than English.
- There is an expectation of modest dress & polite manner.
- There are some great sites for walking, diving and other tourist activities during respite from clinic work.






A lucky Year for the Lab Rat?


